Fancy a Cotswolds retreat, a Norfolk barn or a Cornish escape? Joanna Tweedy picks the best

Fritton Lake Farm Cottages Norfolk

Cottage is a misnomer when it comes to the properties at Fritton Lake Farm. These are trendy design-led cabins, sleeping up to six, with chic minimalist decor that manages to keep cosiness at

the fore with the inclusion of woodburning stoves. Guests can also access the Club House, a gorgeous membersonly gastropub, although the kitchen is closed on Christmas Day. The outdoor heated pool is ideal for early morning invigoration, or hardier folks will just plunge straight into the lake for a wild swim. Great Yarmouth is 20 minutes away by car and its 15-mile beach is gloriously empty in December. Details Four nights' self-catering for six from £2,169 (frittonlake.co.uk)

Henry's Cornwall

Named after a local chap who ran the shop below this whitewashed Cornish retreat, Henry's is no more than 30 paces from Port Isaac's harbour. It's owned by Laurence Llewelyn-Bowen, the interiors star, who renovated the three-bedroom property (sleeping six) while respecting its original features. There are glossy black floorboards, navy sofas, a crackling fire and exposed timbers alongside floral flourishes and pops of blush and lavender. You could cook, but why would you? Port Isaac's gastro credentials are strong: we recommend the Stargazy Inn or Pilchards at Port Gaverne, or keep it simple with a pasty and a pint of locally brewed Proper Job ale at the Golden Lion on Fore Street.

Maison Blanche Kent

The Kent seaside town of Deal comes with a smart high street, a promenade flanked by the pebble beach, and historic pubs that creak with smugglers' tales. Just south of Deal, the tiny enclave of Ripple is home to the I7th-century Maison Blanche. As the name suggests, its exterior is bright white, with a front door and window frames in playful baby pink. Inside, it's a jaunty place to spend a week, with pale pink walls, colourful velour sofas, a mini library and sink-in beds. The rustic kitchen is a fine place to carve up a turkey-centred feast.

Hafod Cae Maen Gwynedd

Hafod Cae Maen will put you among rolling Welsh countryside this Christmas. Sleeping eight, this elegant Edwardian villa is a luxury rural retreat overlooking the verdant Dwyryd estuary. There's a panelled library, four snug bedrooms, plenty of board games and terraced gardens that are ideal for hide-and-seek with children. Portmeirion, modelled on an Italian village and with a charming beach, is a ten-minute walk away.

No 7 Upper Lansdown Somerset

The golden architecture of Bath paints a fine festive picture and No 7 Upper Lansdown, a two-bedroom mews house that sleeps four, is the perfect place to celebrate. There are plenty of luxury touches, including John Cullen mood lighting and Ortigia Sicilia products. The big day? The dining table seats six and the kitchen is fit for a chef, let alone





a home cook. The centre of the city, all dressed up in twinkling lights, is a ten-minute walk away. **Details** Three nights' self-catering for four from £1,050 (homewoodbath.co.uk)

Althea Cottage Cornwall

In winter Padstow harbour glints with a merry garland of lights, there's no tourist throng and the seafood is as good as ever. On the high street the two-up, two-down cottage Althea sleeps four in a comfy double and a twin. It dates back to 1860 and comes with an atmospheric arched timbered roof and gothic-style windows. The pine island kitchen has prep space galore, though do test out

Padstow's fabled foodie credentials too. Long walks are a must — the round trip west to Harlyn Bay, just shy of seven miles, takes in some of north Cornwall's most winsome coastal scenery. Details Seven nights' self-catering for four from £840 (harbourholidays.co.uk)

Hoste Barn Norfolk

The converted Hoste Barn, in the grounds of a 16th-century manor house, sleeps four but feels big, thanks to the original 15m vaulted timber-framed roof. Uncork the wine and get the food going in the oak and granite kitchen before eating in the open-plan dining and living room. Sneak off to the snug to

read a new book or retreat to the homely bedrooms — a twin and a double, both of which come with billowing white duvets. Wild and windy beaches are a 20-minute drive away. Details Seven nights' self-catering for four from £1,875 (premiercottages.co.uk)

Birkdale House Lake District

The first thing you'll notice at the 19th-century Birkdale House, on the private Matson Ground Estate a mile and a half from Windermere, is the striking green woodwork. A grand pre-lockdown refurb has updated the

place while celebrating original features, including stained-glass windows, a sweeping mahogany staircase and an original butler's bell panel. If you've done enough cooking in the roomy island kitchen, the local gastropub delivers. Binge on Christmas flicks in the cellar cinema room (it has a pool table too) and toast marshmallows on the terrace fire pit. All five bedrooms, two with en suites, have views of Windermere. 33 The Green Devon

This white and powder-blue Georgian home looks Teignmouth in the face across the lovely Teign estuary. Step over the threshold and you'll find two light and airy sitting rooms, both with wood-burners. For festive dinners there's an electric Aga in the midnightblue kitchen. Besides the first-floor master bedroom with its superking-size bed and roll-top

bath, there are two other bedrooms with king-sizes and one useful twin. Shaldon beach is a four-minute walk away and there are promenades to be had along the river. Afterwards settle in for comfort food at the London Inn, just across the road.

Hillside Cottage Wiltshire

Decamp your big family Christmas to the idyllic village of Edington, where you'll find an extravagant wreath hanging on the front door of Hillside Cottage. It's a super-luxe country retreat that sleeps 12 in six bedrooms, all with en suites (including steam showers) and has a bold red kitchen that is the stuff of amateur cooks' daydreams. An outdoor plunge pool, hot tub and a barn that includes a wet and dry sauna will soothe tired souls, while the Trailhead Cabin, at the end of a little path, is a private games room hideaway, with a fire pit outside. Pick up Wiltshire foodie treats at the Edington Farm Shop next door, including ales from the awardwinning Three Daggers brewery. Whitefield's Cottage Yorkshire

This handsome stone cottage in the 700-acre Studley Royal deer park, near Ripon, has chocolate-coloured leather sofas and a log-burner in the brick fireplace of the living room — perfect for post-Christmas-dinner slumbers. There's a spacious dining room next door and three bedrooms upstairs with antique furniture and decor influenced by nature. You also get access to the ancient ruins of Fountains Abbey, and the follies, statues and mirror ponds of Studley Royal Water Gardens. Up to two dogs can stay; walk them locally, or at Brimham Rocks, 20 minutes' drive away.

Rose Cottage Northumberland

The fragrantly named Rose Cottage is just a short walk from Bamburgh's dramatic castle and its one-and-a-halfmile sweep of beach. From the outside the cottage stakes a claim as the prettiest retreat in the village, its stone exterior cheered by a shamrock green front door. Sleeping four — in a king-size with an en suite, and a twin — the cottage has splashes of smoky blue and grey, with fabrics by Romo and Jane

Churchill. Near by? Feast on just-caught seafood at the Potted Lobster or book in for a festive roast at the Castle Hotel.

Dimpsey Hither Somerset

Book a stay at the vintage shepherd's hut Dimpsey Hither and you'll spend Christmas on a 30-acre rural estate in the Blackwood Hills, an area of outstanding natural beauty in Somerset. Cosy up by the wood-burner, and there's also a hot tub surrounded by fairy lights. The hut's kitchen is fully functioning, although it would be a crime not to book into a nearby country inn for the big day — the Candlelight Inn, a mile away, is a hit with the locals. Cromwell House West Sussex

Whether or not you believe that Oliver Cromwell tried to kill Christmas, staying in a house named after him might at least reinforce the desire for a second helping of pudding. Cromwell House is an immaculately restored grade II listed home in the West Sussex village of Lickfold, with six bedrooms sleeping 12. There's an inglenook fireplace in the entrance hall and a generous sitting room, which looks out across the property's tennis court. Christmas cooking will

Blyford Manor Farm Suffolk

Blyford Manor Farm, which sleeps 12 Christmas at the whitewashed property, which has six double bedrooms (that can be easily converted into twins), a games room and a large, manicured a cosy farmhouse kitchen ramp up the charm, while the Queens Head, a thatched foodie pub, is a short walk away. Southwold, with its independent shops, the Adnams brewery and famous pier, is 12 minutes' drive.

be done using the five-door Aga in the kitchen, and other treats include a hot tub, a swimming pool, and a sauna and steam room.

The Salutation Cumbria

An all-mod-cons apartment in the grounds of grade II listed Netherby Hall lets guests tap into the historic splendour of Cumbria's honey-hued home — seat to the Graham family for almost 400 years — and then retreat to a modern pad. The Salutation, with its freshly painted white walls, is perfect for families, with a king-size en suite room and sofa bed for the children. You'll arrive to find the apartment fully decorated to reflect the season too. Just above the River Esk, this is Borders country: there are 36 acres of the estate to wander, with misty Scottish hills beyond them. Dogs are allowed. Coachman's Cottage Co Antrim

Roll through the iron gates of Stranocum Hall, an imposing Georgian manor house, and check in for Christmas at the rustic two-bedroom Coachman's Cottage, which dates from the mid-18th century. Rustle up Christmas lunch in the cosy kitchen, before decamping for drinks by the wood-burner in the sitting room. This



corner of Northern Ireland is Game of Thrones location territory — watch Jon Snow et al at the cottage, then head out to visit the filming locations, including Carrick-a-Rede rope bridge, Cushendun Caves and Downhill Beach. Don't miss a trip to atmospheric Dark Hedges either — the region's famous canopy of beech trees is just two miles away. **Details** Seven nights' self-catering

Cotswold cottage Worcestershire

Pretty as a greetings card — and a vision of cream walls and light stone this three-bedroom luxury cottage near Beckford, in the Cotswolds, has

been thoughtfully renovated with young families in mind. The large gardens are enclosed, there's a big farmhouse kitchen for relaxed dining and a "baby suite" off the master bedroom. There's underfloor heating, a log-burner, Egyptian cotton linen and fluffy white towels. The historic riverside town of Tewkesbury is 15 minutes away by car. The Old Parlour Cheshire

This characterful barn near the pretty village of Wrenbury may be the perfect bolt hole for a small family Christmas. Why? There's a statement antler light

fitting in the lounge area, while faux furs and a wood-burning stove enhance the cosy midwinter vibe. A roll-top copper bath tub is ideal for long soaks, and the two bedrooms, one on the mezzanine level, come with White Company linens and products. The Cholmondeley Arms, just up the road, was named gin pub of the year 2021, so is ripe for a Christmas Eve tipple. Tenbury Cottage Shropshire

Just east of Ludlow, this inviting rural cottage has two bedrooms sleeping four people (and two dogs). There's a neutral colour scheme of pastels and mid-blues and it's open plan, with a wood-burner and spacious doubles. You're in the middle of 12 acres of farmland too, with the Clee Hills and Mortimer Forest wrapped around that, so there's no excuse for not walking off the Christmas excess. There's fun to be had too in the stables next door, which have a dartboard and an open fireplace BYO festive tipple and you've practically got your own pub.

▶ stores. A stay at central 12 Banks Street, which sleeps four, puts you in the thick of this ancient market town's festive action. This handsome red-brick Georgian townhouse has white-painted floorboards and moody slate grey walls — with matching fireplace — and pinstriped sofas on the ground floor, giving way to light-and-bright decor in the two bedrooms upstairs. The Lincolnshire Wolds countryside is perfect for a traditional Boxing Day walk, while the cathedral city of Lincoln — 17 miles away — feels like stepping into a period drama.

Euan Ross-shire

Flee north to Newhall Mains, a renovated farm in Ross-shire, and you could be sharing Christmas with a neighbouring field of Jacob sheep. The two-bedroom Euan is a suitably stylish cottage with a wood-burning stove and a chic drawing room complete with bold wallpaper, a velour sofa in teal and rugs made using wool from those sheep. Bracing walks are available thanks to the gorgeous stretch of wind-lashed beach at Cromarty, six miles away.

Walk into nearby Aberfeldy for indie shops or to watch a movie at the Birks art deco cinema. Your show-stealing festive walk is the 1.5-mile circular route, steep in parts, around the Birks of Aberfeldy.

Pavilion CottageIsle of Wight

Hope for a cloudless Christmas Eve for stargazing on the veranda at Pavilion Cottage in the grounds of Osborne House. The decor is modern and fresh, with soft greys and dashes of colour. You can enjoy the same scenic pleasures Mrs Brown once did, including the Italianate terrace and Andromeda fountain.

As Aspen Snowmass turns 75, the beloved ski resort is inviting all to come and find out what makes it so epic: natural beauty, amazing slopes and a fantastic community

spen Snowmass, Colorado, is the kind of place you fall in love with right away. Partly for its striking beauty, with a skyline of jagged peaks, slopes steeped in snowy forest, and two atmospheric mountain towns. Then there's the world-class ski and snowboard terrain, which includes four separate mountains, and a wide choice of runs for all ability levels, from gentle pistes to extreme, expert-only bowls.

But what really makes Aspen Snowmass is its local community. They are the heart and soul of this iconic resort: everybody here lives for the mountains. And they want to share that passion for nature.

This winter, Aspen Snowmass invites British skiers and boarders to join them to celebrate the resort's 75th anniversary. It's come a long way from humble beginnings, after starting with just one chairlift in 1946. Today, Aspen Snowmass has an amazing 5,527 acres of terrain across four unique mountains, all covered by a single lift ticket.

Aspen Mountain sits above the historic mining town that first drew people to the area. Locals love its quad-burning pistes such as Aztec, steep tree runs in The Dumps and buzzing apres ski scene. Snowmass is the largest mountain, bigger than the other three combined, and it's known for its fantastic tree skiing and snowboarding – try Powerline Trees – burly steep sections like Gowdy's and perfectly–groomed

pistes. Buttermilk is beginner and improver heaven, great for families, and the place to practice freestyle tricks thanks to its exceptional terrain park. It hosts the Winter X Games, one of the world's biggest extreme sports competitions.


Aspen Highlands is the locals' favourite mountain. It is a place of wild and raw beauty, with views that are out of this world and some of the best expert terrain in the area, including the breathtaking Highland Bowl. Some of North America's p on-slope restaurants can bund in Aspen Snowmass.

top on-slope restaurants can be found in Aspen Snowmass. These include Aspen Highlands' Cloud Nine, an alpine bistro at 3,322m that you can ski or board to by day or reach by snowcat for a cosy supper after dark; Cliffhouse at Buttermilk, which has its own wok station and juice bar; Bonnie's, the essential breakfast pancake spot at Aspen Mountain; and Sam's, which serves up incredible Italian cuisine at Snowmass.

The resort's two towns, Aspen

The resort's two towns, Aspen and Snowmass, have their own dynamic dining scenes and lively apres ski options. Apres is always a great way to meet locals: after a few drinks, you can quiz them on their favourite runs and ask them where to find hidden powder stashes – or the secret mountain shrines to Bob Marley, Marilyn Monroe and other stars who've gone to the mountain in the sky. But in truth you'll find friendly

But in truth you'll find friendly locals wherever you go in Aspen Snowmass, all only too keen to chat about how they came for the skiing and snowboarding but connected with the deeper magic of the mountains. Chances are, you'll feel the same way too.
