It wasn't just the woodland setting that won over the couple. 'I recognised the value in the architecture straight away,' says Seamus, who owns dRAW Architecture. 'The house was a very good example of modernism, but with the condition of the existing building, not many would have seen that.' Built

sometime in the late 1950s, what was once a glamorous home at the cutting edge of design had fallen into disrepair. Part of the roof had collapsed, the windows were rotten and damp was everywhere. One of Scamus' first jobs was to put light back into the heart of the building. 'We installed glazing in parts of the roof over the kitchen and hallway, and it completely changed the quality of light,' he says.

The internal layout also needed some radical rethinking. 'The flow just didn't work,' says Seamus, who installed a new underfloor heating system and reclaimed space by removing the wall-hung radiators. A new dining area with built-in seating now defines one end of the sitting room.

While the two smaller bedrooms and a shower room are tucked away up a few steps, the main suite is on the lower level and enjoys direct access into the woods through glazed doors. Next door is a new playroom, which Seamus carved out from wasted space in the main bedroom suite.

'Modernist buildings are all about their relationship to the setting,' says Seamus. 'Here, the sitting room windows focus the view onto the [tree] canopy. This creates a sense of elevation; it's a wonderful thing.

'This summer, I'll be adding a green roof. The building is evolving to become part of the landscape,' says Seamus. It seems appropriate, therefore, that the family's favourite activities include birdwatching and listening to the owls. 'I'd never seen a badger until I spent time here — it's lovely to see the wonder on a child's face when they experience that.'
