
Leap of FAITH

Tackling the sensitive renovation of a historic house has been a challenging but rewarding journey for Alison and Daren Hall

mbarking on a major renovation journey takes a special kind of couple, especially when it is a neglected property that many other house-hunters have walked away from. However, from the moment Alison and Daren Hall set foot in an unloved Jacobean house, they were determined to become its next custodians. 'Since the house is Grade II* listed, we didn't know whether planning permission would

be granted or not,' says Alison. 'Although it was a huge gamble, we just had to buy it.'

The couple had been scouring the UK for a suitable area to live with their daughters, Lilybet, 15, Clementine, 13, and Constance, 11, when Daren came across this neglected three-storey property in a Somerset village. Lured by the wealth of period features, he arranged a viewing. 'Behind the front door lay a spectacular

home with a labyrinth of rooms steeped in character,' Alison says. Built in 1653 for a successful wool merchant named John Horsman, it was extended on the north side in the 19th century and altered through the years, particularly during the 1970s.

Having secured the property and with the planning permission regulations to navigate, the Halls were thrilled when architect Simon Morray-Jones agreed to




come on board. 'The house felt rather higgledy-piggledy and didn't flow well,' Alison says. 'Many viewers were put off by the fact that, rather than a spacious kitchen-diner, there was a small galley kitchen and cramped utility room.'

After many conversations with Simon and his colleague, Helen Carey, plans were drawn up to remove a stud wall to combine the two small rooms and create a spacious dining room, complete with double doors leading out to the garden.

On the other side of the mullioned window dividing the spaces, the former dining room would become the kitchen. On the first floor, a Jack and Jill bathroom was to be repurposed as a study, while a child's bedroom and a dressing room would become two bathrooms. In the attic, the disused space was to become a bedroom.

Once planning permission was granted, building work began. At this point Alison started to think about the decor, taking inspiration for the colour scheme from some old wallpaper that was discovered when they bought the house. 'I felt the muted palette of blues and greens with splashes of pink and yellow in the wallpaper would work beautifully and pay homage to the house's past,' Alison says. To ensure the



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choices would be harmonious and the ideal background for the couple's artwork, Alison invited Joa Studholme from Farrow & Ball to visit. 'Joa was brilliant, lovely and her expert advice definitely helped to crystallise my thoughts,' says Alison.

With atmospheric colours selected, Alison approached Victoria Clark Interiors for help.
