Marianna Hunt meets the couple who had to restore their 200-yearold castle from scratch when it was almost destroyed by an inferno

"This was severely damaged during the fire," Kennedy says. "But we were able to replace it with some from the original block. maica in 1825 to escape prosecution." Having grown up in Weston, Kennedy considers its reputation as "Weston-Super-Mud" not quite fair. "It's beautiful really, particularly this end, which is so empty that sometimes it feels like we have our own private beach."
